At Plant Heritage we are keen to showcase rare and unusual plants, and we have the perfect opportunity for you to display your own threatened plant in our new 'Threatened Plant of the Year' competition launched at RHS Hampton Court Palace Garden Festival 2020

Could you receive the first Threatened Plant of the Year trophy?

If you have a named, garden-worthy cultivar grown or sold before 2005 in the UK or Ireland that is not currently available commercially or not consistently available through commercial sources, it may be eligible for the Threatened Plant of the Year competition.

Applications, including a photo of the plant, will be submitted to Plant Heritage by an online form which will be available on our new website from 1st February 2020. Paper applications will also be accepted. We would love to hear about the history of your plant too.

The process:

- application form will be available on the Plant Heritage website from 1st February 2020
- applications to be submitted by Friday 29th April 2020
- all applications will be checked for eligibility against our Threatened Plants Programme data for eligibility, and reviewed by a panel of both RHS and Plant Heritage representatives
- the top selection of plants will be invited to be on display at RHS Hampton Court Garden Festival from 6 to 12 July 2020
- applicants will be notified that their entry will be on display at Hampton Court by Friday 15th May 2020

We would be delighted to see as many entrants as possible. Applications are open to all National Collection Holders, Plant Guardians, members of Plant Heritage, Plant Societies and exhibitors at Hampton Court Palace Garden Festival.
